KaBOOM!

After October 16th, 2008, the Holly Park Apartment complex in Commerce City would never look the same. Early that morning, over 200 volunteers descended on the

apartments with one goal in mind: to construct a brand new playground in just one day.

The ambitious volunteers consisted of members from The

Home Depot Foundation, KaBOOM!, Mercy Housing Colorado, Holly Park residents, and of course CARE-NET AmeriCorps. The build was made possible by a \$57,400 grant provided by The Home Depot Foundation, as well as a \$10,000 contribution from Mercy Housing Colorado. KaBOOM!, which led the event, "is a national nonprofit organization that envisions a great place to play within walking distance of every child in America."

This particular student is one of the many that have come to see him as much more than a teacher. "I've had more than one kid say that they wish I were their dad," said Bitner.

Originally from Preble County, Ohio, this 24-year-old finance major found his way to Colorado through the magic of CARENET AmeriCorps. "I moved to Colorado to begin AmeriCorps after deciding the finance field was not where I wanted to be," said
